


#### WARNER BROS STUDIO TOUR TRIP



#### **CROWN COURT VISIT**





This immersive experience deepened their understanding of the intricacies of criminal prosecution, providing an eye-opening look at how the law operates in action.

## NORFOLK CONSTABULARY WORK EXPERIENCE WEEK

In October, 72 students from Levels 3 to 5 in Policing, Forensics and Criminology complete a week-long virtual work experience with Norfolk Constabulary.

Traditionally held in the summer holidays with hundreds of applicants for just 50 spots, this program has now been secured annually for East Coast College students interested in police careers, making us the only college to offer this unique opportunity.

Students worked through a full case investigation, from the 999 call to arrest, all the way to the interview and charge of the suspect. They also received guidance on applying to the police. Upon course completion, students will receive a certificate, and their future applications to Norfolk Police will be prioritised.





Student taking part in the virtual work experience


## COLCHESTER ZOO PSYCHOLOGY TRIP

Recently, our Psychology students attended an educational visit to Colchester Zoo! The zoo offered a session on how they use psychology to not only promote the welfare of the animals but also how they attract and keep visitors.

During the session, students revisited their A Level and BTEC studies, such as the use of quantitative and qualitative data in research methods, the role of negative reinforcement and Maslow's hierarchy of needs. This hands-on exploration enriched their understanding of psychology in real-world contexts. After the talk, students spent the rest of the day exploring the zoo, making the most of a memorable learning experience.
